On the Move: Brave the unknown with God

Bible Story: Joshua and the Spies • *Numbers 13–14*

Bottom Line: God can give you courage when others are afraid.

Monthly Memory Verse: When I'm afraid, I put my

trust in you. Psalm 56:3 (NIrV)

SOCIAL ACTIVITY

Opening Activity

What You Need: Painter's tape

What You Do:

- Before you begin, use the tape to create a wide, curvy path with a clear start and finish line.
- Choose one kid to be the "Brave Explorer" for the first round.

Play Together:

- Demonstrate and explain how to play:
 - You will quietly tell the "Brave Explorer" one of the challenges listed below so that no one else in the group hears the challenge.
 - The "Brave Explorer" is not to say the challenge out loud. Instead, they are to lead the entire group down the taped path using motions and sound effects to act it out!
 - The rest of the group is to follow along, copy the actions, and guess what the challenge is.
 - Reveal the correct answer, and then choose another "Brave Explorer."
- Continue rotating until all the challenges have been guessed.
- [Make It Personal] Join in the game! Be a "Brave Explorer" or shout out fun guesses to help break the ice.

Challenges:

- 1. Jumping from building to building: Take big leaps.
- 2. Crossing a wobbly bridge: Pretend to balance carefully as if walking on a shaky rope bridge.
- 3. Climbing a tall mountain: Use big arm and leg movements to "climb" up steep rocks.

- 4. Wading through a swamp: Pretend to step through thick, sticky mud.
- 5. Sailing through a storm: Pretend to hold onto a ship's wheel and sway back and forth
- 6. Jumping over hot lava: Leap from one "safe" spot to another to avoid the imaginary lava.
- 7. Sneaking past a sleeping lion: Tiptoe quietly and freeze if the lion "stirs."
- 8. Escaping a swirling tornado: Run in zigzags and duck down to take cover.
- 9. Crawling through a dark cave: Stay low and carefully crawl through the "narrow" tunnel.
- Marching through a jungle: Push aside tall "plants" and swat away "bugs" as you move forward

What You Say:

"That was so fun! Guessing the challenges was tough, but you nailed it! [Transition] That reminds me of our true story from the Bible today. We're going to hear about some really brave spies. They weren't brave because they were the strongest, but because they knew God was and He was with them. So they trusted God with their big, brave mission. Let's go!"

SMALL GROUP ACTIVITY:

1. Eye Spies Recap

What You Need: "Story Review" Activity Page, index cards, markers, and a timer

What You Do:

- Divide the kids into teams of 3-4.
- Give each team two index cards and a marker.
- Instruct them to write large letters on the index cards:
 - o Card 1: "A" on one side, "B" on the other
 - o Card 2: "C" on one side, "D" on the other

Play Together:

- Say, "Here's how we'll play: I'll read a
 question about the Bible Story with four
 possible answers (A, B, C, or D). Each team
 will have 15 seconds to quickly discuss and
 choose an answer together. When the time
 is up, your team is to hold up the card with
 the letter of your chosen answer!"
- One by one, read the questions and choices out loud from the "Story Review" Activity Page.

- Set the timer for 15 seconds, and start it you've read all of the multiple-choice answers.
- Award points for correct answers and celebrate teamwork!

What You Say:

"Can you imagine being sent on a secret mission? That's what happened when 12 spies went to explore the land God had promised His people. It was exciting, and also a little scary. For 40 days, they saw two big things—the land was amazing with lots of food, but the people and their cities were BIG and strong!

"Most of the spies came back and said, 'Nope. No way! The people are too big!' BUT Joshua and Caleb trusted that God was with them and that He was bigger and stronger than any people they faced. They focused on God, and their view of Him got bigger and bigger, while their fears got smaller and smaller. And that helped them have courage even when everyone else was afraid.

"God was with Joshua and Caleb, and He is also with you. When you choose to follow Jesus, He gives you a helper, the Holy Spirit, who lives in you. So you are never alone, and you don't have to work up courage on your own.

"This week, you might end up around people who are nervous, or scared to do the right thing. But you don't have to be! Focus and focus on God, ask the Holy Spirit to help you, and to give you the courage to face the difficult things you're facing. Remember, [Bottom Line] God can give you courage when others are afraid."

2. Puzzle Race

What You Need: Bibles, and "Verse Pieces" Activity Page

What You Do:

- Give each kid a Bible.
- Direct the kids to look up Psalm 56:3.
- Repeat the verse together several times.
- Take a moment to explain any words that might be unfamiliar to the kids.

Move Together:

- Review the verse motions from Week 1.
 - o The NIV is:

- When I am afraid, (Make a frightened face.)
- I put my trust (Cup hands together.)
- in you. (Point both fingers to the sky.)
- Psalm 56:3 (Hold hands like an open Bible.)

Play Together:

- Divide the kids into two teams.
- Give each team a mixed-up set of puzzle pieces from the "Verse Pieces" Activity Page.
- Say, "When I say 'Go!', your team is to race to put the puzzle together. Once the verse is in order, recite it out loud as a team."

What You Say:

"Awesome job, everyone! I loved seeing you all work together. Psalm 56:3 was written by a man named King David. Sometimes people were chasing David, so he had plenty of experience with fear. But instead of letting fear take over, David made a choice. He said, 'I put my trust in You, God.' And guess what? You can do the same. This verse reminds us that when we feel nervous, afraid to stand up for what's right, or even left out, we can trust God! We can stop, breathe, and ask God to give us courage. This week, when everyone around you is afraid, choose to take a step and trust God! [Bottom Line] God can give you courage when others are afraid."

3. Pray and Dismiss What You Need: No supplies

What You Do:

- Invite the kids to sit in a circle.
- Remind the kids that prayer is a conversation they can have with God anytime, anywhere, about anything!
- Ask: "What do you need courage for this week?"
 - For example, kids might say: "to stand up for a classmate who's being mistreated," or "to apologize to a friend."
- Optional: Set out index cards and pencils for kids who might prefer to write or doodle their prayer requests.
- Close in prayer, pausing to pray for each kid by name.

What You Say:

"Dear God, thank You for each of my friends here today. (Name each kid in your group and pray a sentence prayer for each one as the Holy Spirit leads you.) Fill us with courage! You, God, are bigger than anything we face! That means You are bigger than any fear. Help us believe that You are the biggest! Give us courage to do and say what's right and stand up for what You would even when other people are afraid. We love You, and we pray these things in Jesus' name. Amen."

As adults arrive to pick up, encourage the kids to share this month's Memory Verse, Psalm 56:3, and why it matters!
